Group is a group which will give advice to Whaikaha about making accessibility better in Aotearoa New Zealand.

called the ropū / group.




This Easy Read is from the **Ministry** of **Disabled People – Whaikaha**.



The Ministry of Disabled

People – Whaikaha works to make things better for disabled people by working with:





- o disabled people
- tāngata whaikaha
 Māori / Māori disabled
 people
- businesses.

of Disabled People – Whaikaha.

Where it says **we / our** this means Whaikaha.

Background



We are leading work to make accessibility better in Aotearoa New Zealand.



Accessibility means making sure disabled people can be part of something.



This work to make accessibility better fits in with:



















Te Tiriti o Waitangi / The Treaty of Waitangi is an important agreement between:

Māori

and

• the Crown.

The purpose of Te Tiriti is to:

- protect Māori:
 - o rights
 - taonga / things that are very important to Māori
- keep peace and order
- set up government.



Rights are things that the law says every person should:

- have
- be able to do.



Peace and order means following laws / rules.



The United Nations Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities / UNCRPD is a law lots of countries have agreed to.



It says what governments must do to make sure disabled people get the same rights as everybody else.

The ropū / group will give us advice on how to make accessibility better by telling us:

- the most important things to do and
- how to do them.



We want to make sure the ropū / group has members who are:

- tāngata whaikaha Māori / Māori disabled people
- Turi Māori / Māori deaf people.




The ropū / group will do their work using the ideas in Te Tiriti o Waitangi / The Treaty of Waitangi.

Work programme



The ropu / group will give us advice on what are the most important things to be done in the Accessibility Work Programme.



The Accessibility Work

Programme is a list of the work that will be done to make accessibility in Aotearoa New Zealand better.




The ropū / group will support us to:


- come up with ideas
- decide what ideas are important to do



- make plans
- get ready to do the work.







- work on a good number of plans
- be open about the work we are doing
- be accountable to the disability community.





Accountable means doing things in a responsible way including:

- doing what was promised
- showing how decisions are made
- making sure people know what is going on.

Role of the ropū / group



The ropū / group will work together:

- to give us advice that:
 - o comes from lived experience
 - comes from community connections
 - uses ideas from Te Tiriti o
 Waitangi / The Treaty of
 Waitangi



- on equity for disabled people especially:
 - tāngata whaikahaMāori / Māori disabled people



 Turi Māori / Māori deaf people.



Equity means everyone gets what they need to live a good life.



The ropu /group will also work together:

- using values like:
 - mana taurite equity drivesus




- mana kaha we strengthen and support
- mana tūhura we explore and learn



- by sharing:
 - o skills
 - o leadership.







- live
- behave
- work.



The ropū / group:

- only gives us advice
- does not make decisions for us.




All final decisions will be made by Whaikaha.

Scope / what the ropū / group will do



The ropū / group will:

- work together on **priorities**
- support important projects
- share what they know to support important decisions






- give advice about plans
- think about how accessibility
 outcomes can be made better using:
 - kaupapa Māori
 - o mātauranga Māori









Priorities are very important things to do.



Outcomes means how things end up for people.



For example better accessibility means disabled people will have better lives because they can:

- go to more places
- do more things.



Kaupapa Māori means using all the parts of Māori:

- knowledge
- skills
- attitudes
- values.





Mātauranga is:

- Māori ways of knowing things
- information Māori have known for a very long time.

Membership




The ropu / group will have 10 people from the disability community in it.



The ropu / group will be made up of people who are:














- neurodivergent
- whānau / families of disabled people.








- how most brains work
- what some people think our brains should be like.







- Te Tiriti o Waitangi / The Treaty of Waitangi
- how the Crown / Government and Māori get along
- the United Nations Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities / UNCRPD.



How members will be chosen



People can apply to join the ropū / group through an Expression of Interest / Eol.



An **Expression of Interest** means officially saying that you are interested in taking part in something.



A panel of people from the disability community will consider / think about all the people who apply to join the ropū / group.



Whaikaha will lead the panel.



The panel will choose people who:

- come from diverse / different backgrounds
- know a lot about accessibility.

Job length and size



Most members will be part of the ropū / group as an individual / 1 person.



Up to 2 places on the ropū / group might be filled by people from organisations so there are members from many different backgrounds.



In the first year of the ropū / group:

 5 members will be chosen to serve for 1 year

and



 5 members will be chosen to serve for 2 years.



5 new members will be chosen every year after that by Expression of Interest / Eol.

Member roles




Rōpū / group members will choose a co-chair from their group who will work with the co-chair from Whaikaha.



Rōpū / group members will share their:

- skills
- lived experience.



Rōpū / group members will:

- talk about the Accessibility Work
 Programme
- give advice and ideas on decisions for the Accessibility Work Programme.














- support everyone working together
- make sure what everyone says is thought about carefully.



Rōpū / group members will choose 2 members to take part in the Whaikaha **Steering Group** meetings for the Accessibility Work Programme.



A **steering group** is a group of people who lead the work being done on something.



People from outside the ropū / group who know important things might be asked to give information sometimes.

Meetings



The ropū / group will meet 4 to 6 times each government financial year.

A government **financial year** goes from:


• 1 July

Most hui / meetings will be held online.



- in person
- in Wellington.





Each hui / meeting will go for up to 4 hours.



Members will also be paid for up to 2 hours for the work they do to:

- get ready for the meeting
- follow up after a meeting.



The members will decide:

- meeting times
- breaks
- accessibility needs.





Hui / meetings will have karakia / prayer at the:

start

and

• end.



The karakia is for building:

- relationships
- whakawhanaungatanga / Māori ways of getting along with people.



Remuneration / pay



General rōpū / group members will be paid 61 dollars an hour.




The co-chair will be paid 77 dollars an hour.




Whaikaha will cover reasonable costs for things like:

Whaikaha will support the ropū / group to use tikanga / Māori ways of doing things like:

- karakia / prayer
- waiata / song




 whakawhanaungatanga / Māori ways of getting along with people.




Whaikaha will support the ropū / group with:

- organising the hui / meetings
- taking notes during the hui / meetings









- paying the members
- accessibility like:
 - o interpreters
 - o Captions
- meeting assistance.



Conduct / how people will behave



We will ask members to:

- treat other people well
- include everyone



- be impartial
- be people who can be trusted
- use the values:



- mana taurite equity drivesus
- mana kaha we strengthen and support



 mana tūhura – we explore and learn.









Impartial means to do things:

for the good of everyone and

not just for yourself.

Members are expected to be part of the ropū / group:

 because of their knowledge of accessibility

and

 not because they represent / speak for other organisations.

Confidentiality and conflict of interest



The ropū / group members will be given:

- an appointment letter
- a confidentiality document
- a conflict of interest document.



An **appointment letter** is an official letter that:

- says you have been given a job
- has information about the job.



Confidentiality means not talking about something with people who should not know.



A **conflict of interest** is when someone has different things they need to do like:

- their job
- supporting a family member.



Doing different things at the same time can make it hard to make a fair decision.



It is important to tell people about a conflict of interest so things can be kept honest.



Rōpū / group members must behave by the rules in the:

Privacy Act 2020

and



Official Information Act 1982.

Closing down the Accessibility Advisory Group



Whaikaha may close down the Accessibility Advisory Group if things change in the Government.


Review of the terms of reference
