




Cabinet paper – New Zealand Disability Strategy Refresh

A Cabinet paper is a document:

- from a Minister
- asking Cabinet to agree to something.





A **Minister** is an important person who works in the Government.

They are in charge of what the Government does about things like:

- education
- transport.



Cabinet is a group of the most important Ministers.



They make important decisions together.





This summary is about decisions Cabinet made in March 2025.









These decisions were about how to:

- refresh the New ZealandDisability Strategy
- talk to disabled people about refreshing the New Zealand Disability Strategy.

Refresh means changing an old document so that it works better.

The New Zealand Disability

Strategy tells the Government how
to make things better for disabled
people in Aotearoa New Zealand.

When you see the words **Disability Strategy** in this Easy Read they
mean the New Zealand Disability
Strategy.



The **Ministry of Disabled People – Whaikaha** wrote this summary.



The Ministry of Disabled People – Whaikaha works to make change for disabled people so their lives are better.



The Ministry of Disabled People – Whaikaha makes things better for disabled people by working with:



the Government



- the community which includes:
 - o disabled people
 - tāngata whaikaha Māori /
 Māori disabled people
- businesses.

About the New Zealand Disability Strategy



About 1 out of every 6 people in Aotearoa New Zealand is disabled.



Life is often harder for disabled people than it is for non-disabled people.



The Disability Strategy we have now started in 2016.



This Disability Strategy ends in 2026.



The **Minister for Disability Issues** is in charge of the Disability Strategy.



The **Minister for Disability Issues** is the person in the Government in charge of making things better for disabled people.



The Minister for Disability Issues is Louise Upston.





She wants to write a new Disability Strategy.



She wants the new Disability Strategy to last 5 years.

This means the new Disability
Strategy will last from 2026 to 2030.



The new Disability Strategy will have:

- a vision
- principles
- 5 main outcome areas.



Here **vision** means ideas about what things should be like.



The vision in the Disability Strategy says what Aotearoa New Zealand will be like when it is a better place for disabled people.



Here **principles** are ideas that guide the Government to reach its goals.



The principles in the Disability
Strategy are the main ideas that will support the Government to make
Aotearoa New Zealand a better place for disabled people.




Outcomes are how things end up for people.

Outcome areas are the different parts of life which the outcomes fit into.



The Disability Strategy will say what needs to be done in each of the outcome areas to make things better for disabled people.







1. Education



2. Employment



- Health 3.
- Housing
- Justice. 5.





The education outcome area is about:

- learning
- places that support people to learn like schools.



2. Employment

The employment outcome area is about jobs.

3. Health



The health outcome area is about things like:

- doctors
- hospitals
- medicines.

4. Housing





The housing outcome area is about where people live.







The justice outcome area is about things like:

- the Police
- courts.



It is also about making sure laws protect the **rights** of disabled people.



Rights are important things that everyone should:

- have
- be able to do.



Some examples of rights are the right to:

- vote
- go to school.



The Disability Strategy will also support **local government** to make things better for disabled people.



Local government means the councils that run things in each part of Aotearoa New Zealand.



The Disability Strategy will also support **community organisations** to make things better for disabled people.









Community organisations:

- are not part of the Government
- work to make life better for people who need support.

Many community organisations support disabled people by doing things like:

- supporting people to find jobs
- training dogs to support disabled people
- running homes for disabled people.

Writing the new Disability Strategy




Whaikaha will be in charge of writing the new Disability Strategy.



They will write the new Disability Strategy in 2025.



To write the new Disability Strategy Whaikaha will work with groups that **represent**:





- tāngata whaikaha Māori / Māori disabled people
- the whānau / families of disabled people.



To **represent** a group of people means to speak up for those people.

Whaikaha will also work with **Disabled People's Organisations** to write the new Disability Strategy.



Disabled People's Organisations are groups that:

- represent disabled people
- are led by disabled people.



Whaikaha will work with these groups to write the:

- vision
- principles.



Each outcome area will have actions.



Actions are ideas the Government can do to make things better for disabled people.



Whaikaha will set up **working groups** to write the actions for each outcome area.




A **working group** is a group of people who work together to do a job.



There will be a different working group for each outcome area.







- disabled people
- people who work for the government
- people who have jobs to do with the outcome area.





From August 2025 everyone in
Aotearoa New Zealand will be able to
read a **draft** of the new Disability
Strategy.



A **draft** is the first version of something like a document.



New Zealanders will be able to tell Whaikaha what they think about the draft.



Whaikaha will use the things people say about the draft to write the final version of the new Disability Strategy.



The Minister for Disability Issues wants to **release** the final version of the new Disability Strategy on 3 December 2025.



Here **release** means making the new Disability Strategy public so everyone can read it.



3 December is the International Day of Persons with Disabilities.

Ministerial Disability Leadership Group



The Minister for Disability Issues has set up a **Ministerial Disability Leadership Group**.





The Ministerial Disability Leadership Group:

- is a group of Government
 Ministers
- will lead the work the Government does for disabled people
- will make decisions about the Disability Strategy.









The main Ministers in the Ministerial Disability Leadership Group will be the Ministers for:

- disability issues
- social development
- employment
- housing
- health
- education
- local government
- children.







- benefits which are money you might get if you cannot work
- supporting people to find work
- working out who gets state housing.



Sometimes other Ministers will be asked to go to Ministerial Disability Leadership Group meetings.

Decisions made by Cabinet



Cabinet had a meeting on 11 March 2025.



At this meeting the Minister for Disability Issues asked Cabinet to say yes to the plan for writing the new Disability Strategy.



Cabinet said the Minister for
Disability Issues could write a new
Disability Strategy.



Cabinet said the new Disability
Strategy could have:

- a vision
- principles.



Cabinet agreed that the 5 outcome areas in the new Disability Strategy would be:



- education
- employment



- health
- housing
- justice.



Cabinet said yes to how Whaikaha will write the new Disability Strategy.



Cabinet said the working groups could write the actions for each outcome area.



Ministers will decide which actions will be in the final version of the new Disability Strategy.



Before New Zealanders can read the draft Disability Strategy it will be checked by:



- the Ministerial Disability
 Leadership Group
- the Minister of Justice.



The Ministers will also check with the rest of Cabinet if they think they need to.



The Minister for Disability Issues will tell Cabinet about the final Disability Strategy in November 2025.



Hopefully Cabinet will say they agree to the new Disability Strategy.




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
